


Methodology


- Public Opinion Strategies presents the key findings of a statewide survey in Wisconsin.
- The survey was completed May 30 June 1, 2017, among 600 likely voters and has a margin of error of ±4.0%.

The importance of transportation to the economy is felt across the state





"And, over the past 5 years, do you believe Wisconsin's roads have..."







"And, who do you think is most to blame for Wisconsin's roads getting worse?"






There is a strong opposition to construction delays in the Milwaukee area


Transportation funding: New taxes & fees, or from elsewhere in the budget, are strongly preferred over more borrowing

Transportation funding: Local option receives strong support




Transportation funding: Voters support an extra \$4 a month for an immediate solution

Transportation funding: New revenue (yes), borrowing and delays (no)


"What do you think are the best ways to meet Wisconsin's transportation funding needs?

"Now, I'd like to read you two statements about transportation funding. After I read the statements, please tell me which comes closest to your own opinion."




We should pay for transportation projects by borrowing more money

We should use a pay-as-you-go system


Six-in-ten voters support prevailing wage, with an even split among GOPers, and a majority of soft GOPers
